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Missouri's Public Health Emergency Preparedness Program

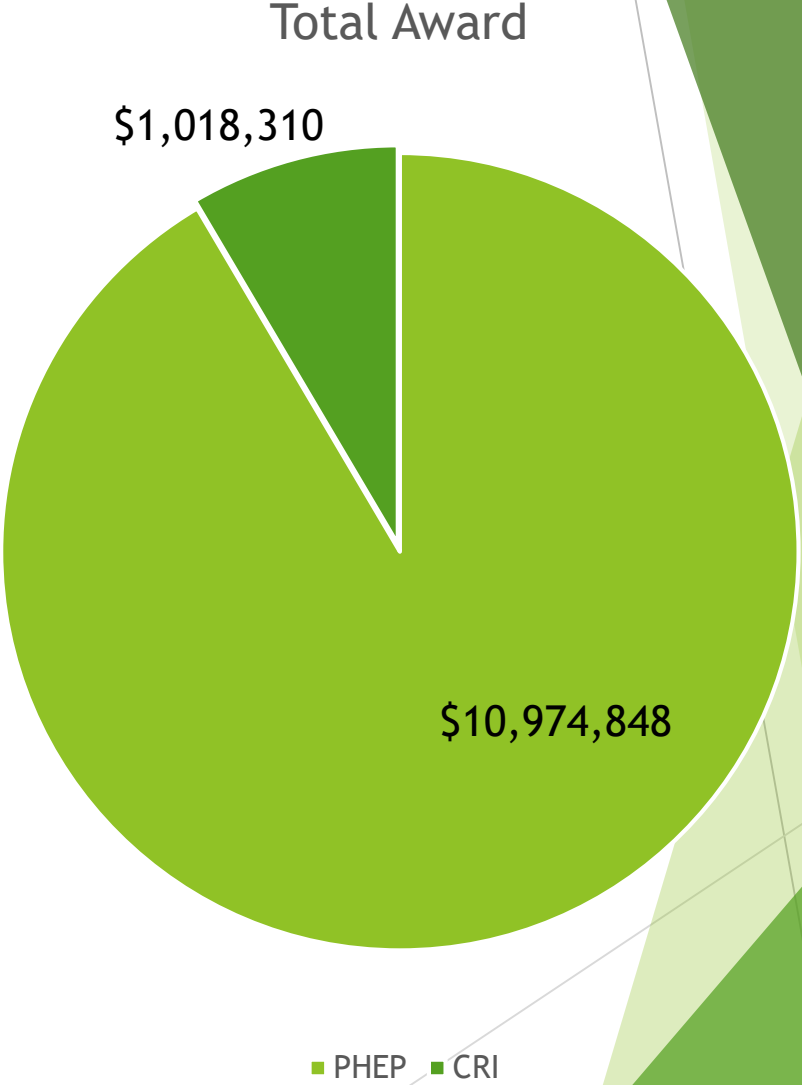
Purpose:

Public Health Preparedness: \$ 10,974,848

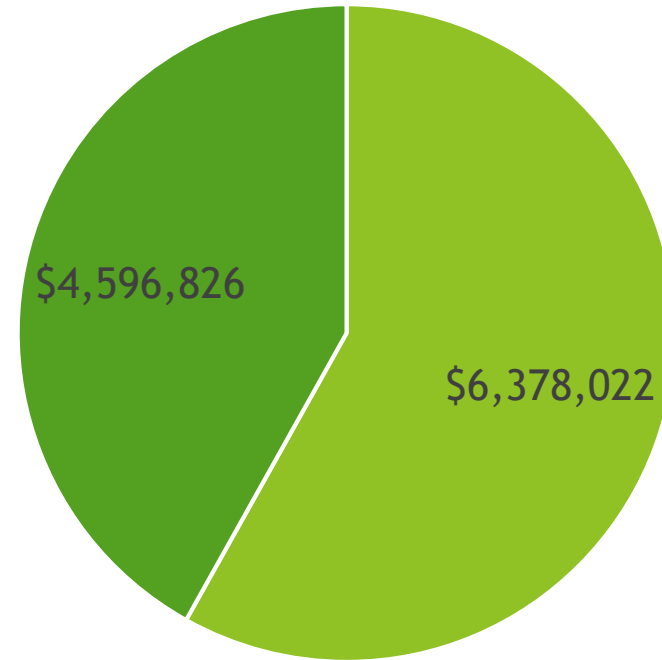

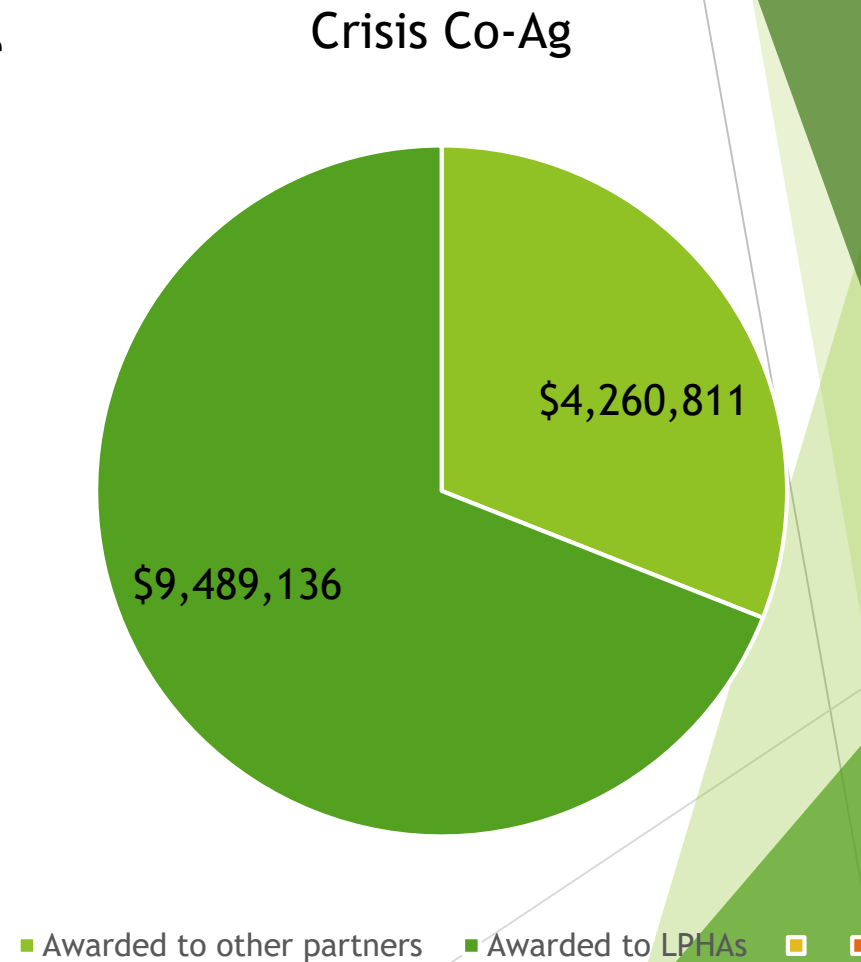
PHEP Award to LPHAs

15 PHEP Capabilities into Six Domains:

❖ **Domain 1: Community Resilience**

The ability of a community, through public health agencies and health care coalition, to develop, maintain, and utilize collaborative relationships among government, private health care organizations, and community organizations to develop and utilize shared plans for responding to and recovering from disasters and emergencies.

Capability 1 - Community Preparedness

Capability 2 - Community Recovery

❖ **Domain 2: Incident Management**

The ability to establish and maintain a scalable operational structure with the processes that appropriately engage all critical stakeholders and support the execution of core public health and health care capabilities and incident objectives.

Capability 3 - Emergency Operations Coordination

❖ **Domain 3: Information Management**

The ability to develop systems and procedures that facilitate the communication of timely, accurate, accessible information, alerts and warnings using a whole community approach and exchange health information and situational awareness with federal, state, local, territorial, and tribal levels of government, health care coalitions, and their individual members.

Capability 6 - Information Sharing

❖ **Domain 4: Countermeasures and Mitigation**

The means to provide resources for awardees, as well as health care coalitions and their members, to increase their ability to store and deploy medical and pharmaceutical products that prevent and treat the effects of hazardous substances and infectious diseases, including pharmaceutical and non-pharmaceutical equipment (e.g., vaccines, prescription drugs, masks, gloves, and medical equipment) and the resources to guide an all-hazards approach to contain the spread of injury and exposure using mitigation strategies (e.g., isolation, closures, social distancing, and quarantines).

❖ **Domain 5: Surge Management**

The ability to coordinate health care, medical and support staff volunteers; share resources, staff, and patients, as necessary and appropriate, across a health care coalition so that each member health care organization can effectively manage surge incidents by creating additional direct patient care capacity across a community; utilize and coordinate the expertise of the public health, health care, and emergency management disciplines to ensure the public has access to high-quality direct patient care and mass care during emergencies; and prevent and manage injuries and fatalities during and after a response to an emergency or incident of health significance.

❖ Domain 6: Biosurveillance

The means to conduct rapid and accurate laboratory tests to identify biological, chemical, and radiological agents; and the ability to identify, discover, locate, and monitor through active and passive surveillance, threats, disease agents, incidents, outbreaks and adverse events, and provide relevant information in a timely manner to stakeholders and the public.

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Missouri's Hospital Preparedness Program

Funded by DHHS Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response:

Missouri's allocation for July 1, 2021-June 30, 2022

\$3,626,688

“The purpose of the FOA is to strengthen and enhance the acute care medical surge capacity through the maintenance and growth of strong HCCs within each HPP-funded state . . .by ensuring that HPP recipients focus on objectives and activities that advance progress toward meeting the goals of the four capabilities . . . and document progress in establishing or maintaining response-ready health care systems through strong HCCs.”

Definition of a Healthcare Coalition:

“a collaborative network of healthcare organizations and their respective public and private sector partners . . . that serve as a multiagency coordinating group to assist with preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation activities, related to healthcare organization disaster operations.”

Four Capabilities:

- Foundation for Health Care and Medical Readiness
- Health Care and Medical Response Coordination
- Continuity of Health Care Service Delivery
- Medical Surge

(Note: In previous project periods, HPP had eight capabilities which aligned with PHEP's fifteen capabilities. Now the HPP 8 are basically collapsed under the four domains and further refined.)

Required core members of healthcare coalition:

- Hospitals
- Public health
- Emergency medical services
- Emergency management

Effective July 1, 2017, no healthcare coalition without four core members may receive ASPR funding.
