

There is an app called PulsePoint AED which can be used to locate local AEDs!


PulsePoint AED is a powerful tool to build, manage and mobilize an emergency AED registry. Registered AEDs are accessible to emergency call takers and disclosed to those nearby during cardiac arrest events.

Help build your community registry now! PulsePoint AED is a simple yet sophisticated tool to record and share AED location information. You can help even before a life is in danger by easily identifying public access AEDs throughout your community. Direct citizen participation can also help create greater location awareness and mindfulness of the important role AEDs play in out-of-hospital cardiac arrest survival.

Once AEDs are identified, their locations can be viewed by anyone using the PulsePoint AED app—or the PulsePoint Respond app in PulsePoint connected communities.

Problems discovered with AEDs already in the registry, such as a closed business or an AED that is no longer present where shown, can easily be reported right in the app—helping to keep the registry accurate and reliable.

Are you interested in learning more about cardiac arrest events in Missouri?

We would love to share with you the Cardiac Arrest Registry to Enhance Survival (CARES) registry for the state of Missouri. <u>CARES</u> is a collaborative effort of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Emory University, Woodruff Health Sciences with the goal of improving survival from sudden cardiac arrest.

CARES manages an online database system that reduces the time involved in registering out-of-hospital cardiac arrest (OHCA) events and provides the ability to track first responder and EMS response times as well as patient outcomes. CARES can be used by a variety of groups, including:

- Hospitals
- EMS agencies
- Ambulance services
- Fire departments
- Researchers



The CARES registry is designed to help local agencies identify:

- Populations affected by sudden cardiac arrest.
- Location and timing of those events occur.
- Which elements of the system are functioning properly, and which are not.
- How changes can be made to improve cardiac arrest outcomes.

NEW – DHSS Missouri Health Data Tool

The Missouri Health Data Tool is a reporting and mapping platform designed to help users find community and state data quickly and easily. The Missouri Health Data Tool houses the 2022 Missouri County Level Study (CLS), which provides county, regional and state data on health conditions and behaviors among the Missourians. In the Map Room, visitors can create custom maps for their community with data from the County Level Study, as well as data from over 120 national secondary sources.
