EXPANDING KNOWLEDGE OF THE DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT OF COMMON SKIN DISEASES

The Dermatology ECHO will improve timely, accurate and cost-efficient care for patients with common skin diseases. Primary care providers will join a team of dermatologists to discuss best practices and evidence-based approaches to:

- Early-stage identification of skin cancers
- Complex skin infections
- Common skin conditions like acne, rosacea and psoriasis
- Ulcers and unusual skin appearance

HOW DOES THIS ECHO WORK?

Primary care providers in Missouri will join interactive online video conferences with dermatology experts from two academic medical centers. University of Missouri experts will offer learning sessions from 12 to 1 p.m. the first and third Fridays of the month. Washington University dermatologists will offer learning sessions that emphasize urban and specialty care from 7 to 8 a.m. the second Wednesday of the month. Participants may join one or both sessions.

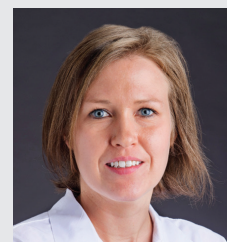
